

#### HARPUR-CREWE SETTLED ESTATES

Thank you for your letter of the 26th November and for the copy of Caroline L Turner's death certificate and also her photograph. I would have said myself that she looked a very determined lady - I suspect the hotograph was taken in India and I suspect that in those days photography where was even less advanced than it was in Europe and it was necessary for her to hold a pose for a considerable time.

To turn now to the entail, the estates we re-settled by Sir John's Will and Sir Vauncey's marriage settlement between 1876 and 1886. The terms of this settlement were Sir Vauncey for life and the succeeding entail was his eldest son and his eldest son and so on and if any line came to an end the second son and any further sons and their respective descendants and if at any generation there were no sons (or none left) then the eldest daughter and her eldest son and so on and then the second and third etc daughters - so that once the estate descended a generation it could not go up a generation again unless there had been a total failure of that and succeeding generations and the rule was in this

IN 1938 HILDA MOSLEY, ON TAKING LEGAL ADVICE, BYPASSED HER THREE YOUNGER SISTERS AND LEFT THE ESTATE TO HER NEPHEW CHARLES JENNEY, SO THAT ON HIS DEATH IT WOULD PASS TO HIS ELDEST SON, OR IN THE ABSENCE OF SONS, TO HIS ELDEST DAUGHTER.

IF THERE WERE NO CHILDREN THEN TO HIS BROTHER HENRY JENNEY ON THE SAME BASIS, AND IF HE LEFT NO CHILDREN THEN TO THEIR SISTER AIRMYNE ON THE SAME BASIS, CHANGING THEIR NAMES FROM JENNEY TO HARPUR-CREWE

# MRS MOSLEY CLEARLY ANTICIPATED THE POSSIBILITY THAT HER NEPHEWS AND NIECE WOULD HAVE NO CHILDREN AND THEREFORE SPECIFIED IN HER WILL THAT IN THAT EVENTUALITY THE ESTATE SHOULD PASS TO HER NEAREST CREWE RELATIVE.

MRS MOSLEY DIED IN 1949, AND LEGALLY CHILDREN MEANT ONLY LEGITIMATE CHILDREN, SO IT WAS ESSENTIAL THAT THE HEIR TO THE ESTATE BE LEGITIMATE













IT IS POSSIBLE THAT THE MOTHER OF WALTER, JOHNSTON AND CAROLINE ANNA NEED ALSO DIED IN 1814, PERHAPS AS A RESULT OF THE BIRTH OF HER FOURTH CHILD.

AS AN INDIAN, SHE WOULD HAVE BEEN BURIED ON THE DAY OF HER DEATH, ACCORDING TO HER FAMILY'S RELIGIOUS RITES AND THERE WOULD BE NO CHRISTIAN RECORD OF HER BURIAL.

#### THE BIBI



TOWARDS THE END OF THE 18TH CENTURY, THERE WERE ONLY 250 EUROPEAN WOMEN IN CALCUTTA, WHILE THERE WERE 4,000 MEN.

THE BIBI WAS AN INDIAN MISTRESS, A COMMON LAW WIFE, OR LONG TERM CONSORT OF THE ENGLISHMAN, WHO COULD AFFORD TO SET UP EVEN A MODEST ESTABLISHMENT. AT TIMES THEY GOT MARRIED BUT THERE WERE INSUPERABLE DIFFICULTIES IN THE WAY OF A CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE WITH A PAGAN.

THERE WAS NO STIGMA ATTACHED TO THESE LIAISONS.
THE BIBI OF A SAHIB WAS HIGHLY RESPECTED IN
SOCIETY.



#### MARRIAGE OF MISS LOUISA HARPUR CREWE. (From a Correspondent.)

The wedding of Miss Louisa Harpur Crews only daughter of Edmund L. Crewe, Esq., of Repton Park, to Ion Turner, Esq., Lieutenant in the 16th Lancers, only son of Dr. and Mrs. Turner, of Kensington, took place at Repton on Thursday last. This auspicious event was ushered in by brilliant weather, and a large concourse of visitors were present. The hospitalities and festivities continued for three days. In addition to the splendid dejeuner at the Hall, tents were erected in the pleasure grounds for the tenantry of the estate, tradespeople, and numerous attendants. A little before 12 o'clock the bridal party issued from the porch adjoining the tower on which the union jack was hoisted. The whole distance to the church was decorated with garlands and flags. On arriving at the church they passed through the assembled children of the schools, each holding a bouquet which on the return of the bride and bridegroom were strewed at their feet. The service was read in a very impressive manner by the Rev. H. Harpur Crewe, rector of Drayton Beauchamp, Bucks., cousin of the bride. The attractions of the bride and bridegroom and the elegance of the bridesmaids elicited great admiration, and the whole of the arrangements were very complete. The bridal party consisted of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund L. Crewe, Master J. E. H. Crewe, Rev. H. H. Crewe, three Misses Crewe, Miss Wardlow, Miss Johnstone (bridesmaids), Charles Crewe, Esq., George Crewe, Esq., Edward Crewe, Esq., Dr. and Mrs. Turner, Mr. Scotshard (best man), Miss Cheslyn, Rev. John and Miss Whitaker, Miss Bailey. Amongst the numerous guests at the breakfast were Mrs. Pears, Rev. W. Williams, Dr. Perrott, Rev. J. and Mrs. Smith, Dr. Hewgill, Rev. W. and Mrs. Mousley, Mr. F. and Mrs. Barber, Rev. F. Spilsbury, Mr. Richardson, &c. &c. Sir John and Lady Crewe and other relatives of the family were unavoidably absent from the neighbourhood.

On the following day the school children and their teachers, the attendants, and the old women of the village, amounting to upwards of three hundred persons, were feasted on the lawn, the scene being one of hearty enjoyment. THEY MARRY IN **SEPTEMBER** 1861, AND THE FIRST CHILD, LOUISA EMILY EDITH, IS BORN IN **NOVEMBER** 1861. WHEN ION TURNER AND CAROLINE LOUISA REJOIN HIS REGIMENT, FIRST IN ENGLAND, THEN INDIA, AND FINALLY MOVING TO AMERICA, THE CHILD IS LEFT AT REPTON PARK WITH EDMUND LEWIS AND CAROLINE CREWE.



PART OF THE INHERITANCE WAS SETTLED ON ION TURNER, BUT HIS MOTHER STATED SHE WOULD NO LONGER SEE HIM AS HIS RECKLESS EXPENDITURE CAUSED ALL HER TROUBLE.

SHE INTRODUCED HER SON TO HER FRIEND, MISS CREWE, WHO WAS 7 OR 8 YEARS OLDER THAN HIM, AND WHEN THEY MARRIED DR TURNER SETTLED £200 ON THE COUPLE







### **FREE LAND**

IN 1862 THE U.S. CONGRESS PASSED THE HOMESTEAD ACT.
THIS LAW PERMITTED ANY 21-YEAR-OLD CITIZEN OR IMMIGRANT WITH THE INTENTION OF BECOMING A CITIZEN TO LAY CLAIM TO 160 ACRES OF LAND KNOWN AS THE GREAT AMERICAN PRAIRIE.


